
Arguments for the Requirement of Local Church Membership for Partaking of Communion

These arguments are rooted in the fact that Communion is a sacrament of the Local Church. Every slice of the argument pie contains the ingredient of discipleship under Christ in His Church under pastors.



The direction of the arrows indicates a deepening of ideas associated with discipleship in Christ's church under leaders owned by members as their own ("your leaders").

- 1. We enter the church by a public repentance-baptism to learn apostolic doctrine and partake of communion.
- 2. Thus, partaking is under church authority and belongs to those who commit themselves to it.
- 3. Participation belongs to those, therefore, who are identified by their public commitment to the church under her leaders.
- 4. Good order requires a higher standard for communion than for voting and other similar things requiring good order. If voting requires membership, then how much more ought communion to require membership.
- 5. The sacraments are two sides of the same coin: covenant making and covenant renewing. So, if a baptized non-member takes communion, he renews a commitment that does not exist.
